Our 33<sup>rd</sup> Conference and Annual General Meeting was held from October 12-14'12 in Trinity. Our theme for this convention was "Steady as She Goes: Creating an Authentic Experience". We were so pleased to have worked with Provincial Historic Sites and the Town of Trinity as they partnered with your association to bring our conference to this scenic community that is so steeped in history.

On the Department of Tourism, Culture and Recreation web sites it states: "Newfoundland and Labrador is known for its friendly people. Real and genuine, warm and welcoming, fun-loving and funny to the core, the people here are also known for their natural creativity, unique language, and knack for storytelling. Your association boasts a compliment of 150 member museums and heritage societies. These sites have over 1,000 volunteers in 120 communities. MANL will be presenting at the pre-budget Consultations this February recommending that our provincial government continue the current level of support to our membership. This is a two day workshop where participants will explore the basic principles of conservation within the context of a museum setting. Other topics this workshop will focus on are: conservation condition reporting, care and handling and the ethics of restoration and conservation.

What is your favourite soup? Turkey


What is your favourite restaurant and why?



# Sir William Ford Coaker AGM

The Sir William Ford Coaker Heritage Foundation Inc. In Port Union, held their Annual General Meeting on December 6<sup>th</sup>, 2012. It was an opportunity to look back on the activities of the Foundation for the past year and reflect on the accomplishments. The mandate of the Foundation is to restore, educate and present the story of Port Union, and while doing this the Foundation has become an economic generator for the area. With support from its various government partners the Foundation created over 80 positions in the region last year. These jobs helped fill our mandate in restoration, interpretation/education, archival and artifact preservation.

The focal point of the Port Union National Historic District and Provincial Heritage District, The Fishermen's Union Trading Company Retail Store and Salt Fish Plant restoration was completed this year. A huge

undertaking that presented some challenges, The FUT building remains an iconic symbol of Port Union. It is with sincere thanks and appreciation to the funding partners Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) Department of Innovation Business, Heritage Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador, Service Canada, Department of Advanced Skills and Education, Department of Municipal Affairs and Iceberg Canada.

While completing the restoration work at the Fishermen's Union Trading Company Retail Store, in an unknown cellar underneath we found over ninety boxes of archival material. We are now working on preserving another part of the history of Port Union with continued archival preservation.

The Road Scholar/Routes to Learning programs are still a key element to the educational portion of the Coaker Foundation's mandate.

It was noted that changes in funding programs will make it a challenge as the Foundation moves forward to carry out a mandate to look after a National Historic District and Provincial Heritage District. It comes at a time when the Port Union area is suffering from closure of two plants and seeking recovery from such an economic downturn in the area. However, the Foundation is pushing ahead and are hoping to play a part in the economic recovery for the area.

The Foundation also released plans for the next year when they will be partnering in a new program with ERA Architects in Toronto with the Culture of Outports program.

# Wooden Boat Museum of Newfoundland and Labrador

The Wooden Boat Museum of Newfoundland and Labrador, is a not for profit dedicated to safeguarding the legacy of our wooden boat building traditions by celebrating the past and passing on the strengths of these skills to younger generations.

The Museum Headquarters is in Winterton, Trinity Bay; approximately 90 minute drive from St. John's. The onsite Museum at Winterton is operated for the Town of Winterton by its Heritage Advisory Board. This partnership allows the board to focus on developing its Provincial mandate while being provided a flagship Museum to house its Provincial Exhibit and conduct its many programs and activities.

The Museum in Winterton tells the story of the wooden boat and its contribution to the economy and way of life in Newfoundland and Labrador. Accompanying the story are various full sized boats and models that show the many types of boats which have shaped Newfoundland and Labrador's history. In addition to bringing the story to life, on display throughout the Museum are artifacts which illustrate traditional fishing methods, maritime culture, and boat building. In our boat building room visitors are introduced to the knowledge, skills and techniques required for boat building. Here visitors can view boat building tools, a boat being constructed and various techniques used in boat building-leaving the visitor with a new found respect for this timeless craft. Throughout the open season the Museum's interpreters offer daily talks and demonstrations to visitors.

The Museum's other programs include:

**Documentation Project** – As the last generation of boat builders and their boats fade away, we lose the opportunity to preserve the past and apply it to the future. In every coastal community, wooden boats unique and significant in their shape and construction techniques are discarded like driftwood. The builders who built these vessels have hung up their tools and buried their skills, with no record of their methods or experiences ever made.

Our professional Researchers will work alongside representatives from communities and heritage organizations around the Province to identify and document key boats and their builders.

Newfoundland's First Steam Locomotive 0-6-0 saddle tank: #1884

The Rooms Provincial Museum is embarking on a project to research the background and significance of the antique steam locomotive now located in the grounds of the Mary March Museum.


As the very first locomotive constructed for railway use in Newfoundland (in 1881) this relic is an important and iconic piece of our history.

We are asking anyone who may have information, stories or photographs featuring the loco's history to contact us.

Built by Hawthorn Leslie of Newcastle-on -Tyne, England in 1881, it was delivered to the Newfoundland Railway in March, 1882 and worked on construction of the St. John's – Whitbourne - Harbour Grace rail links, completed in 1884.

The loco continued in service with the Newfoundland Railway after the take-over by the Reid-Newfoundland Co. in 1898. It was sold to the Anglo-Newfoundland Development (AND) Co.'s Botwood Railway in 1918. Re-numbered AND "No. 7", the loco worked as a shunting engine in the Grand Falls mill yard and also hauled light utility trains on the company's main and spur lines. Operating until the mid-1930s, it was condemned and dumped in a local landfill site in 1937.

Recovered from the landfill and donated to the Museum by the Price (Nfld) Pulp & Paper Co. in 1977, it was refurbished by a group of dedicated volunteers in 1979-81.

# Disasters and the Archives: An ANLA Symposium

The Association of Newfoundland and Labrador Archives held the annual archives symposium on November 23 at St. John's City Hall. The theme for this year's symposium was "Disasters and the Archives" as 2012 is a milestone anniversary year of many natural disasters that affected our province. The events of the day not only looked at natural and marine disasters that happened in this province, but also archival disasters, such as floods or fires.

The day's events included several panel sessions with local authors, journalist and playwrights, researchers and archivists who discussed their archival experiences. The first panel, chaired by Emily Gushue, included authors Joan Sullivan and Mike Heffernan and geologist/author David Liverman. The second panel included authors Frank Galgay, J.P.Andrieux and Robert Parsons. Each panelist discussed their written

works and their methods for obtaining primary and secondary sources. These were lively discussions that gave the audience an inside look on how each author develops their works.

Valerie Burton took part in the symposium as a guest speaker and gave a very interesting talk on the "absence of the Titanic in Newfoundland", a discussion that looked at how Newfoundland's history does not place particular focus on this monumental disaster. During the lunch break local musician/archivist Allan Byrne performed a selection of Newfoundland folk songs and discussed how these songs can be used as archival

sources. The last panel session of the day included Heather Wareham (Maritime History Archive), Helen Miller (St. John's City Archives), Colleen (Centre for Newfoundland Studies, Memorial University of Newfoundland) and Joan Mowbray (The Rooms Provincial Archives) who talked about the collections in their archival holdings that relate to disasters and how an archive can deal with a disaster of their own.

Overall it was a very informative day with riveting discussions on the topics of disasters and archival research.
